Frog Bite

INTERESTING FACTS!

Frogs are more likely to bite if they feel threatened or cornered.



FROG TEETH

Most frogs have teeth, but they are generally not used to bite but to hold prey.



BITING SPECIES

The Pacman frog is one species known for its biting; it has a strong jaw and can deliver a painful bite.



TOXICITY

Some frogs, like the Poison Dart Frog, do not bite but have toxic secretions that can be harmful if touched or ingested.



BITE EFFECT

A bite from a non-venomous frog may cause mild pain and redness but is generally not harmful.

A bite from a venomous species or contact with toxic secretions can cause symptoms ranging from irritation and nausea to paralysis and death, depending on the species and the amount of toxin.



FIRST AID

Washing the bite area immediately with soap and water is recommended.

PREVENTION

Wearing gloves when handling frogs can prevent bites and contact with toxins.
